President's Column

One-hundred fifty years ago the Oil Creek Valley was far different than what it is today. The mountainsides were stripped bare of trees and there was almost as much oil in the creek as water. At that time Pennsylvania's natural resources were so vast and diverse that no thought was given to the fact that they could indeed be destroyed. So the exploitation went on unchecked and a number of species of plants and wildlife was lost. Fortunately though, through time and conservation practices the valley and creek has been restored and many of those species have been reintroduced and recovered.

But now, one-hundred fifty years later, the valley is faced with more destruction, but this time there are no known cures in sight.

The park's new problems are known as invasive species. Plants like purple loosestrife and mile-a-minute weed crowd out desirable native plants species, eventually taking over altogether. Emerald ash borer, gypsy moth and wooly adelgid are a major threat to ash trees, oak trees and our official state tree the hemlock. Some sprays can be effective, but over 7,000 acres of state park is too costly to protect in such a way. Deer ticks which were relatively unknown just a few years ago have become a prominent problem now, carrying at least four serious diseases to humans.

There's also a new danger to one of the park's mammals this year. Some of our bats have been found to be infected with a disease called white-nose syndrome. A white powdery substance forms on the bats' nose which gives it its name. When the bats hibernate in the wintertime the disease wakes them up when it's still cold outside. They leave to find food but none is available so they end up starving to death. Little is known about the disease and no cure has been found.

Some people who don't care for bats might think this is a good thing, but instead it can be very detrimental to everyone. Bats eat an enormous amount of insects in the course of a year. Without this service of nature, farmers will have to spend more money on insecticides which means higher prices at the grocery store. The risk for human diseases carried by mosquitoes could become much higher too.

However, the Friends of Oil Creek State Park are playing an important part in researching this problem and you can help. Twice a year we have a bat count in the park and record the number of bats seen during an evening. This information is forwarded to the biologist at the Game Commission's regional office in Franklin. The first bat count for this year was conducted on Friday evening, June 14th. Although the count was down a little bit in some places, overall the count was much higher than expected since over 90% of the state's cave bats have been wiped out already.

Our second bat count will take place on July 12th from 8:00 till 9:30 PM. Bring a comfortable lawn chair and some bug repellant. The park will supply a counter and a place to watch. Robin Baker the park's naturalist will have a short program about bats prior to the actual count.

The causes of the valley's destruction was easy to see as was the solution for solving it way back when. But today's problems aren't so easy. However, counting bats, pulling weeds by hand and other volunteer projects can go a long way towards finding ways to combat these invasive species. Please do what you can to help so you and your descendants have a healthy park to enjoy for many years to come.

Oil Creek Bike Trail

The Oil Creek bike trail is 9.7 miles. What makes this trail so unique, besides the amazing sights along the way, is that it is built along an historic railroad grade. Along the way bikers are able to stop and read interpretative signs depicting the oil industry's activities in the 1800's. The various locations of pipelines, oil explorations, boom towns, as well as many other oil related places are denoted on these signs. The trail, which follows Oil Creek, is bordered by flowers in both the spring and summer. In addi-

tion to the beautiful woods and the woodland plants, wildlife is often seen... deer, porcupines, eagles, blue herons, as well as many other woodland animals and water fowl. Because of the canopy covering most of the trail, even on the hottest days, the trail seems cool. Well experienced to beginner bikers will find this a trail well worth riding. There are small rain shelters, picnic tables, benches, and cleared areas for views along the way.

Both Petroleum Center and Drake's Well have picnic areas and rest rooms. Petroleum Center has bike rentals... Drake's Well has the Drake's Well Museum which has great artifacts concerning the oil boom.

There are two trailheads with parking. One is located at Jersey Bridge next to Drake Well Museum which is near Titusville, and the other is near the Oil Creek park office in Petroleum Centre which is close to Oil City. Both trailheads have access to PA Route 8.

2013 Summer Biathlon

The 2013 summer biathlon will be held August 10th. It is a great event run by the Friends of OII Creek, It is our largest money maker and helps us sustain various projects throughout the year.

As mentioned in a n earlier newsletter...The summer biathlon combines the skills of shooting a .22 caliber target rifle and trail running is a 6k race is divided into three parts. The



timing starts with waves of one or two runners leaving every minute and running a 1.2 mile loop mostly on the ski trail. You come into the range (located behind the ski hut) and shoot 5 shots in the prone position at a 4.5 inch metal knock down target 33 meters away. For each missed target you run a 70 meter penalty loop. Next, you run the same 1.2 mi loop and return to shoot 5 shots from the standing position. You then run any penalty loops for targets missed and finish with one more 1.2 mile loop with your final time ending at the finish line.

There is a mandatory safety clinic for all first timers before the race. For those who don't have their own rifles, rifles are provided by the Pennsylvania Biathlon Club for use the day of the race. There are awards given in 6 age groups and a prize raffle for participants who run penalty loops. Many volunteers are also needed for the event to be a success.


